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A Few Words from Father Pat

On Sunday, November 8th, we had a wonderful dedication of our renovated Church Basement or Assembly Hall. The dedication included a blessing, a variety show and refreshments. Over 150 people attended the festivities. I am very pleased with the renovated space that will benefit the parish as a multipurpose area for fine arts (band, plays, variety shows, dance), adult faith formation, brides-to-be, the parish bazaar, etc. I am grateful for all who helped including generous benefactors, contractors, architects, designers and engineers, workers, artists, Rosary Altar and the list goes on. There are still some minor finishes that we will be working on in the next month or so as we see how the space is being used. The one major finish is the retractable stairs for the stage that were not designed to our specifications. However, we have a fix for it so we are hoping to do the work over the Christmas holidays when the area is free from scheduling constraints. Thanks for your patience over these past few months as the project was completed.

Over the past 6 plus years, it seems like there has been some major project and a variety of minor projects going on continuously. That is true. When I became pastor I did not imagine how much of my time would be given over to construction and renovation. But we have managed to tackle a lot of projects to upgrade our campus to be more functional, safer and more aesthetically pleasing. There is only

one other major project that I foresee doing during my pastorate and that is to look at the side windows in the Church. They were put in as temporary windows in 1935. Some 75 years later, the windows are now energy inefficient. There are a growing number of cracks in the windows for which we no longer have replacement glass. When we open the windows, there is no way to keep bats, bugs or birds out of the Church (we've had problems with all three of those categories). There is not an urgency here but we will start to look at this issue more seriously now that the higher prioritized items have been completed.

Although the buildings and grounds have undergone a major transformation, what the pastoral council, finance council and I have identified is a need to look at our communications/ technology infrastructure

and abilities. In particular, our major task this year will be looking at our parish website (the school website is in very good shape). There are a variety of issues to consider including design, content, infrastructure needs and management. You might ask why we need to do this as the website is reasonably functional. However, as society moves to a more web-based existence, our effort to evangelize or share the good news of Jesus Christ must be cognizant of this reality. Pope John Paul II spoke about this in terms of the "new evangelization." For instance, my recent talks on health care reform drew 50-60 people per session. These were impressive numbers. Yet, the other night I

was visiting with some new parishioners in their home as they were caring for their three young children. For them, it would be very difficult to come to a series of talks in the parish. Nevertheless, we had a lengthy and excellent conversation about health care reform during my visit. The couple would clearly benefit from the talks. This is where developing the infrastructure and ability easily to tape the talks and post them on the website would be helpful so these people could listen to the talks after the kids were in bed in the comfort of their own homes. This is but one simple issue. Providing additional links will be helpful as well. There are many other issues that our parish councils have identified. We are in the process of assembling a group of technologically savvy people to help with the project including **Paul Tatarsky** who has been immensely and indispensably helpful over the years in helping us with many of our IT infrastructure needs in the parish and especially in the school. We are very excited about the possibilities as we move forward with this "electronic renovation" in the next several months.

Speaking of evangelization, at our Fall dinner we not only were treated to a gourmet meal by our own **Phil Hurley**, we were spiritually nourished by several excellent presentations by parishioners speaking about how their faith and their life of prayer helped them through a variety of transitions in their lives. What

was most significant was that many people came up to me afterwards and mentioned we should have more opportunities to hear each others' stories of how we live out our faith. I hope to do so. This simply is what is at the heart of evangelization. We tell people how Christ has made a difference in our lives. I was very proud of **Dave and Carrie Pagliarini, Pat and Jana Hughes, Gene and Jan McNally and Don and Jan Haasl** for their contributions. Their willingness to share and affect the minds and hearts of others is a challenge to the rest of us. Although they are all good people, they are really no different from the rest of us. We all have a story to share. And by sharing our own unique story, we have the ability to touch someone in a way no one else can. We all have awesome gifts and an awesome responsibility. It is my hope that we will take seriously our vision statement as a parish: "As a vibrant faith community, Blessed Sacrament Catholic Parish shall seek to involve all parishioners in the mission of evangelization."

Catholic Charities Honors Mark Landraf



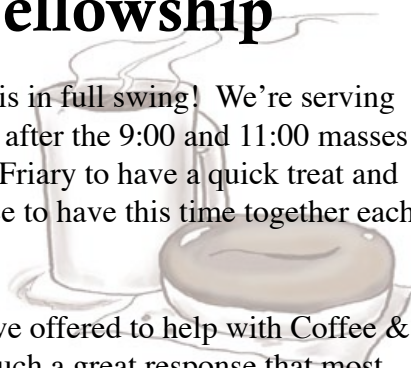

October 16 would have been Brother Dominic Rothering's 91st birthday. The students had a Dimes to Dollar Drive in Brother's memory. All money was donated to the Combat Blindness Foundation. Students, teachers and parents gathered in front of the church and were led in a prayer service by Mr. Joe Thompson and his homeroom students. A bench, which will be placed in front of church, was also dedicated in Brother Dominic's memory.



In September the junior high students spent a week at Nature's Classroom, an environmental camp in Mukwonago, WI. All subject areas were integrated into this educational experience and students were taught the importance of being good stewards of our earth. In addition to academic knowledge, the lessons and activities fostered team work and compassion for others.

The primary students raised nearly \$11,000 through their Hunger March on September 24. The students contributed \$400 to Adam Argall's Eagle Scout project for Pregnancy Helpline, \$1,500 to Blessed Sacrament's chapter of the St. Vincent de Paul Society and \$500 to the Catholic Multicultural Center. The rest of the money will be distributed to local, national and international groups that help the poor and the suffering.

Project Girl, started by parishioners Kelly Parks-Snyder and Jane Bartell, is a ground-breaking girl-led, arts-based initiative created to enable girls to become better informed critical consumers of mass media advertising and entertainment - in other words, to become more media literate.

The purpose of Project Girl is to enable girls to look at all media forms with smart eyes so that they control the interpretation of what **they** see and hear rather than letting the interpretation control them. Adolescent girl advisors, leading scholars, educators, media activists, health experts and artists all helped to create the Project Girl media literacy curriculum, and traveling Art Exhibition.

Girls will explore: 1) basic media literacy concepts; 2) stereotypes, labeling, bullying; 3) body image and the beauty myth; 4) consumerism; and 5) real girl power.

Project Girl's unique approach uses art as the means to educate, inspire, reflect, transform and encourage social change. Project Girl is art for art's sake. Project Girl is art for girls' sake. 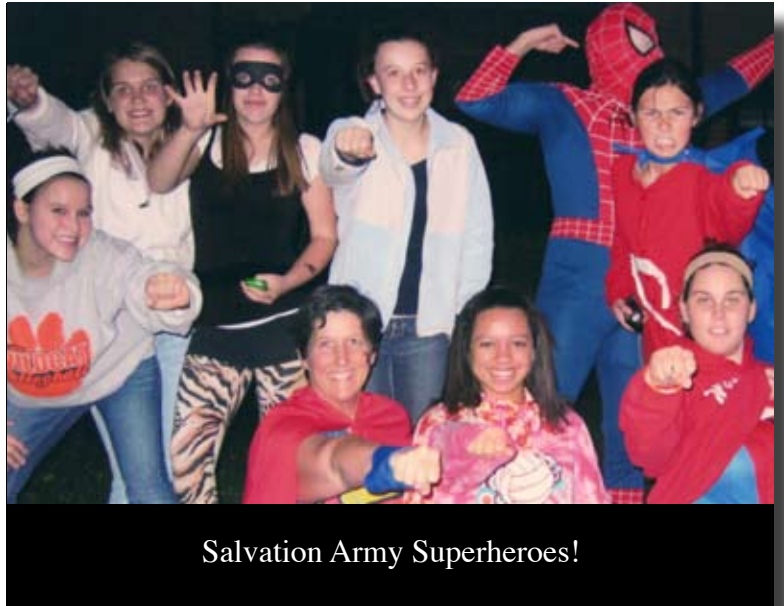
Making a Difference in the Lives of Children and Teens

Pastoral Care

The Handbook

Situation #1: It's Saturday night and Josh suddenly remembers that he is supposed to serve Mass the next morning, the first time in quite a while. He panics and pleads, "Mom, I can't do it! I don't remember how. Don't make me do it, please!" Oh, my. What is a Mom or Dad to do? Josh said he would serve Mass, it's his responsibility, but you don't want it to be a mortifying experience for him – or for you, either.

Situation #2: Jennie, a new parishioner, volunteered to be a lector. She went through the required training but then missed her first lector assignment because she had to be out of town for work. Now at last she will have her debut as a lector at the 9:00 A.M. Mass, and she is nervous! She can't remember if she is supposed to walk up the ramp or up the sanctuary steps at the beginning of Mass. And she wants to practice her reading until she feels really comfortable with it. Where can she find the reading, anyway?

The help both Josh and Jennie need is now available at their fingertips. The first step is to go the computer and type in www.blsacrament.org. There they will find the new handbook for liturgical ministries, with policies, procedures and practices for servers, lectors, ushers, gift bearers, etc. The handbook was developed by the Liturgical Ministries' Committee of the Spiritual Life Commission to fill a clear need for such a handy resource.

Once Jennie or Josh has pulled up the Blessed Sacrament home page, the next step is to select **Liturgical Ministry Policies**. If Jennie wants to print out the Guidelines for Lectors section, she should **click on PDF file** and once the document is on the screen, click on the print function to select the pages she wants to print. In a few minutes she should have what she needs to put her mind to rest and enable her to prepare well to read the scriptures at Mass the next day, including information about where to find the Sunday readings on-line.

We hope that parishioners will make full use of the liturgical ministries' handbook. Even if you are not new to a specific liturgical ministry, we urge you to read through the guidance for your ministry. At the very least it will be a review for you, but you may also find that the preferred procedure is somewhat different from what you have been doing. The liturgical ministries' handbook was developed so that our weekend liturgies might be as beautiful and prayerful and worshipful as we can make them, for the glory of God.

The handbook is now available on the parish website, but we will continue working with it to make it as useful and reliable as possible. One goal is to have each individual ministry section separately dated, so that when we make changes to the Guidance for Ushers, for example, the date on that section would be changed. This simple procedure will make it simple to know if one has the latest 'edition' of the Guidance for Ushers or the guidance for any other ministry.
