A Few Words from Father Pat

It is hard to believe that summer is upon us. The school year went by very quickly. I am already anticipating that the fall will be here before we know it. The reason time seems to fly by so quickly is that we have all become so much busier in our lives. For most people, even the summer time is taken up with a variety of activities. Gone are the days of relative leisure in which we have very few commitments. The focus in our lives is doing rather than being. We forget the Gospel story of Martha and Mary. Jesus tells Martha that Mary has chosen the better part by simply being in his presence, in the presence of the Lord. Most of us, even after being reminded of this passage, are unconvinced by the words of Jesus. With the ability to communicate 24/7 through instant mes-

saging, text messaging, tweeting, e-mail, we seem incapable of simply "being." Even when we seek that time for uninterrupted solitude, we wonder: "Am I missing an important text message?" Sad to say – I see this invading even the sanctity of the golf course as more and more golfers are on the phone as they walk the fairways. The golf course along with the Church were to be the last bastions against communication technology! Well, no longer. Even the Church has lost a sense of the importance of being. I look at all of the activities going on in our parish this summer including mission trips, young adult activities, book

club discussions, talks, etc.: there is a lot of "doing." St. Augustine said that we should pray as if everything depended on God and work as if everything depended upon us. In some ways this is sage advice if we avoid emphasizing the latter at the expense of the former.

Consequently, we must make a conscious effort to strike a balance between being and doing, between contemplating and sharing with others the fruits of our contemplation, between prayer and work.

This can be difficult.

The world around us encourages and entices us to be Marthas and not Marys. For instance, even though there has not been substantial job creation during this time of economic upheaval, productivity is up significantly. This is because

people have been asked to work harder to cover for the work of those who lost jobs to downsizing. In addition, people are more leery about taking vacations lest their absence suggest that they are inessential to the well-running of their company. Yet we must make an effort to find time for leisure and prayer. Our commandment to keep holy the Sabbath is not some slavish rule to follow. No, we are made for the Sabbath and not vice-versa. So this commandment from God must have important values undergirding it. The observance of the Sabbath ensures that we have time to pray – to be in the presence of God. It

also makes sure that we rest physically and mentally. This is not just important for our bodily well-being but also our spiritual well-being. When we are tired, we have a harder time praying. We have a harder time resisting temptation.

As we move forward into the summer and the calendar on the refrigerator or in the blackberry becomes more and more crowded, let us commit to slowing down a bit. Let us commit to be content in simply reveling in the presence of our loved ones. Let us commit to recognizing that the work will always be there. Let us commit to moderation in all things. Yes, sloth is a vice – but so is the opposite – workaholism.

Of course, as I conclude my thoughts on the subject of workaholism, I have to confess that I may not be following my own advice this summer. As some of you know, I was elected to be one of a handful of Dominicans from the United States who will be delegates to the Dominican General Chapter in Rome. Originally it was scheduled for Nagpur, India but was recently moved to Rome. Every nine years, Dominican friars (priests and brothers) gather from throughout the world to elect the new Master General of the Dominican Order. After the election, the delegates work for several weeks more on the Acts of the

Chapter which is the basic legislation that applies to members of the Order. In addition to the friars, other members from the Dominican Family attend the Chapter. Thus, it is an incredible gathering of Dominican brothers and sisters from throughout the world for an entire month. Unfortunately, there will be little time for sight-seeing as everyone is eager to complete the legislative process and get back to their own ministries. I will be away at the Chapter in Rome from late August until late September. This is assuming that there is no volcanic ash plume delaying my return. Therefore, I am not scheduling anything until after the first week in October. This means I have to get many things in place for the fall during the summer. So it will be a busy one! During my absence, Fr. Ron, as the parochial vicar, will take my place. Fr. Matt Walsh, one of the priests living in the Priory, will assist him with sacramental help. I would ask that you keep me in your prayers during these days ahead and while I am away in the Fall.

Making it Beautiful; Keeping it Clean

Blessed Sacrament on Pentecost Sunday, marked the end of the Easter season. The color of Pentecost is red and the church was vibrant with a red altar cloth, banners and wall-hangings, dramatic floral arrangements of red and white, and a circular stained glass image of the Holy Spirit, tongues of fire falling from Him, was suspended over the sanctuary. Now we have returned to Ordinary Time, the weeks that do not fall within the liturgical seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, or Easter. So, clearly, Ordinary Time is not 'ordinary' at all, since it makes up the bulk of our worship year. Happily for me, the color of Ordinary Time is green, my favorite color.

Making it beautiful: The work of transforming the church environment from one season to the next is one of the responsibilities – and joys – of the Spiritual Life Commission. (Check out the accompanying photos.) Dee Temprano heads up our Environment Committee, and Jerry Scullion, Fr. Ron Kreul, and I are part of the core team. We miss Pat McGee, another stalwart member of the troop who recently moved back to California. We are often assisted, however, by other parishioners, especially in preparing for Christmas or the Triduum, when going from Holy Thursday to Good Friday to the Easter Vigil requires the skills and speed of a quick-change artist. We are so grateful to everyone who helps out during those busy times

Keeping it clean: To those coming to church, it is obvious when we go from one liturgical season to another, but on a daily and weekly basis much needs to be done to keep the church looking clean and fresh, and that's not so obvious or as much fun. The custodial staff vacuums the church each week, but their basic labors are complemented by a roster of women and girls who take a two-week shift of light housekeeping. Prior to the weekend liturgies, these good souls dust the windowsills and other surfaces, wash the holy water fonts and refill them, empty wastebaskets, straighten the hymnals, pick up odds and ends left in the pews and in the vestibule and generally spruce up the church interior. Meanwhile, another set of volunteer helpers takes care of picking up the dirty Mass linens, takes them home for washing, folding, and ironing, and returns them late in the week. Thank you, ladies!

Despite these on-going efforts, periodically it becomes necessary to do some 'spring cleaning' – washing windows, climbing the step ladder to dust the top of the rood screen, sweeping and dusting the choir loft, vacuuming the pew cushions, pursuing dark, dusty cobwebs high up in the beams... Fun! This spring we had a major cleaning on March 26, prior to Holy Week.

We would like to thank all those who came and spent 3-4 hours cleaning with Dee and me. Finally, we are very pleased that Fr. Matt Walsh, O.P., has agreed to work with parishioners interested in lay Dominican spirituality. A group of parishioners will meet once a month for the next six months – starting in June – to begin exploring this particular way of living the Christian life.
